

DID YOU KNOW?

- **YOU CAN REGISTER TO VOTE ON THE SAME DAY OF THE ELECTION (November 5, 2024) at your voting location.**
- Native Americans did not have the right to vote until 1948. Even so, we were not eligible to vote in every state until 1962.
- Women did not have the right to vote until 1920.
- Only 66% of eligible Native American voters are registered to vote. If every eligible Native American in the US were to vote, there would be an additional 1.2 million potential new eligible voters.
- If representation in Congress was proportional to the US Native American population, we would have 2 Native American Senators and 8 Native American members of the House.
- New Mexico ranks 3rd highest of 47 states to have the highest populations of voting-age Natives. Only Alaska and Oklahoma rank higher.
